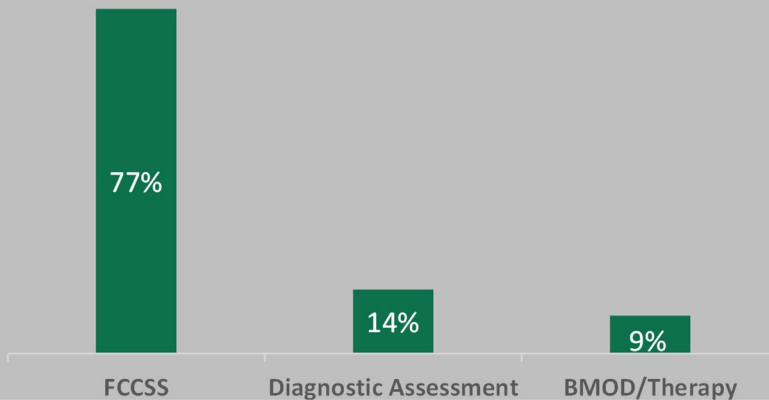

Helping youth & families be successful!

JusticeWorks BehavioralCare provides a full range of services. The Rehabilitative Behavioral Health Services includes diagnostic assessments, crisis intervention, therapy, family counseling, independent living skills, family education, and behavior modification. The youth and families served come from diverse backgrounds and experiences and present for services with varying levels of strengths and resources to tackle their situations. The Family Centered Community Services works with families who have been diverted from child welfare involvement providing in-home services for linkages to needed services and parenting assistance.

History

JusticeWorks BehavioralCare (JWBC) offers a full range of rehabilitative or supportive counseling services to children and families working with South Carolina's Departments of Social Services, Juvenile Justice, Education and Mental Health as well as self-referrals since 2011. JWBC is a Qualified Medicaid Provider which has demonstrated that its proactive approach to services can ameliorate severe problems for multi-challenged youth and their families.

Discharge Outcomes

JusticeWorks strives to provide the most effective treatments and services that a family needs right in their own homes and communities. Services are geared to restoring a child and family to healthy functioning so that they can fulfill major life functions. A key outcome for JusticeWorks' services is to prevent out-of-home placements and the need for the youth to receive services at a more restrictive level of care.

In the RBHS services, parents and youth complete ratings of the child's functioning on the Columbia Impairment Scale at the beginning and end of services. There were only 4 pairs of pre/posttests collected and thus will not be reported. Additionally, staff complete a comprehensive Discharge Outcomes rating about how the family and child are functioning on important life domains. Results are reported on this page.

In the FCCSS program, assessments are completed using the Family Advocacy & Support Tool (FAST). The Family Service Plans (FSP) are set up with the families to meet the identified needs and progress is noted in session notes. The FAST and FSP is updated every 90 days and again at discharge to provide information regarding the progress that the family has made during services.



RBHS Discharge Outcomes

(N = 268)



75% of youth were living in their home at time of discharge.



73% of youth were considered to have a positive or neutral dc.



95% of youth had a family support system in place at discharge.



96% of caregivers had a family support system in place at dc.



89% of youth were enrolled in school or trade school.

FCCSS Discharge Outcomes

(N = 1601)

87% of families were free from DSS involvement.

RBHS

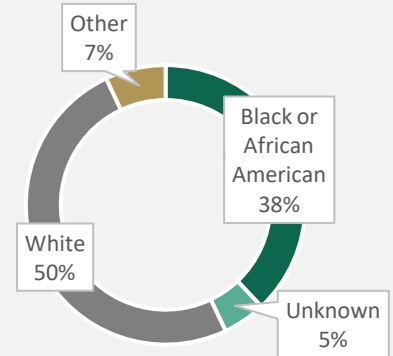
The youth and families who come for Rehabilitative Behavioral Health Services are referred from various sources such as Continuum of Care, Departments of Mental Health, Social Services, Education, Juvenile Justice, or private referrals. After an eligibility verification process, the individual is assigned to a clinician who conducts an assessment. A recommendation is made for services and treatment begins. Treatment plans that establish goals for services are developed that are unique to each client to address his or her needs. Referral concerns range from behavioral problems to depression and anxiety concerns.

FCCSS

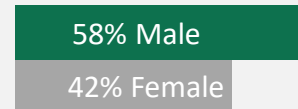
FCCSS are prevention services aimed at addressing conditions affecting the stability of family life such as: poverty, young parental age, relational issues, and parental or child disabilities where child abuse and neglect are at greater risk of occurring but are not currently present. The Department of Social Services makes referrals to FCCSS so that families obtain the assistance they need in building protective capacities to enable them to provide a safe, nurturing, and suitable home for their children. JWBC oversees the delivery of services provided by 12 network provider agencies. The model used is one of JusticeWorks' signature programs, JustCare®, a comprehensive approach for addressing family's needs.

Gender of Individuals Served

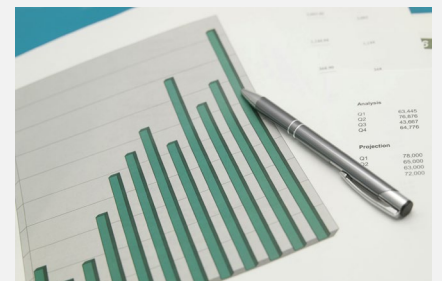

Satisfaction with Services Provided

A measure of success can also be measure with the satisfaction ratings obtained from individuals who have been in services. Quarterly, satisfaction is rated using a validated instrument that measures both satisfaction and the working alliance, bond, tasks, and goals. The results for fiscal year 2023 are shown here.



77% of youth & families felt understood by JWBC staff.

75% of youth & families felt supported by JWBC staff.



75% of youth and families were satisfied with how the program met their

Trauma-informed/Responsive Care

JusticeWorks strives to work with individuals to meet them in a safe, collaborative, and compassionate manner and to build upon their strengths. All staff at JusticeWorks BehavioralCare work to understand, identify, and provide services that are trauma-informed and to avoid practices that may be retraumatizing to individuals and their families.

We provide *person-driven* services to assure that individuals have a voice regarding their services, and we incorporate universal routine screenings for trauma screenings at the time of initial assessment. This information is then used to help drive treatment plans and goals.
